News from Kruse

West Chicago Garden Club gardeners returned to the garden at the Kruse House museum property just last week and will meet every Wednesday from 9-11am weather

permitting.

Gardening began just in time to inhale all the beauty of spring. Literally, at every turn in the garden there is a bright spot of color from the flowering barrenwort along the sidewalk, tulips dotting the landscape, Virginia bluebells, pink and purple lungwort, hot pink pigsqueak, a showstopper of a magnolia tree to blankets of violet-hued grape hyacinths that are children, grandchildren and great

grandchild (probably) of the original ones planted by the Kruse family. A picture will not do it justice to represent how lovely the garden is in spring.

Ephemeral bulbs are not the only thing of interest in the garden. There are several unique species of trees including ginkgo, dogwood, London planetree, an original pear tree, and even a once-thought-extinct Dawn Redwood.

Just a note, from the Metasequoia genus native to China, a forester rediscovered Dawn Redwoods in one single Chinese region during the 1940's. This led to seed collection and distribution around the world. The deciduous Dawn Redwood species sets itself apart from the other two redwoods species (Great Sequoia and Coast Redwood) by changing color to a rusty orange in the fall and then dropping its leaves. Such a treasure to have in this garden!

If you find yourself driving down Main Street at any time you should pull in the driveway and

take a short (or long!) stroll around the garden.



Thank You to our Volunteers!

Last weekend was the start of our very busy Spring season. It was wonderful to see so many members come out to volunteer. The weather was fantastic and we had a good crew for all three events. The Adopt-a-Highway crew raced through the cleanup in just a little over an hour. The Pop-up Potting Party on Saturday potted up a wide assortment of annuals and the Perennial Potting Party on Sunday potted up nearly 600 plants!















... Another method to germinate seeds

Constantly searching for a simple method without the elaborate set up? I found this Seed Snail Method on Instagram by @faridasober. She uses what is called sill gasket foam or packing foam sheets to roll compost into a snail! You can use different width foam depending on your seed needs, anywhere from 4" to 6" or wider, lay out your material, add about 1/2 inch soil-less potting mix, then roll like jelly roll! Tape down the seam so it does not unroll! Some people also like to put this coil in a cup or plastic bag, or something to keep its shape! Now, you can sprinkle your seeds on top of the coil or gently insert a seed an inch or so apart into the coils, then water from the top til your seeds germinate! You should also cover the top with something like a shower cap until the seeds germinate. Ideally, it is best to water from the bottom if your snails are sitting on a tray! I have also seen people use their small germinated seedlings in snail rolls to get bigger before transplanting to the ground! Also, when your plants are getting too big but not big enough to transplant outside or you are not ready to plant because of the weather, you can add a little more potting mix by unrolling your snail, add more potting mix to compensate for the growing roots, then roll them back up! You can also add a weak liquid fertilizer solution to the bottom of your pan when you have your second set of true leaves.

This snail seed method is great for limited space on a window or under a lamp, also on a small heat mat! Seems uncomplicated! This method is great because your seed roots are not all tangled up, the seedlings are easy to separate when potting up! You can harden off your seedlings the same way as if they are in pots before planting them in ground.

Note: the aim is also to recycle/reuse whatever material you already have, so, any used plastic sheets you can cut up or packing foam would be ideal!

What is a Keystone Plant?

I recently attended a webinar where the host referred to specialist/keystone plants. I was intrigued to learn more. Information obtained from: https://www.nwf.org/Garden-for-Wildlife/About/Native-Plants/keystone-plants-by-ecoregion



Native plants are core to the wildlife garden. Intentional use of native plants, which have formed symbiotic relationships with native wildlife over millions of years, creates the most productive and sustainable wildlife habitat. While some plants play a singular role for one or limited types of wildlife, others are essential to the life cycle of many species. The local species of these plants vary by ecoregion, that is, areas where ecosystems (and the type, quality, and quantity of environmental resources) are generally

similar. Keystone plant genera are unique to local food webs within ecoregions. Remove keystone plants and the diversity and abundance of many essential insect species, which 96% of terrestrial birds rely on for food sources, will be diminished. The ecosystem collapses in a similar way that the removal of the "key" stone in an ancient Roman arch will trigger its demise.

The research of entomologist, Dr. Doug Tallamy, and his team at the University of Delaware have identified 14% of native plants (the keystones) support 90% of butterfly and moth lepidoptera species. The research of horticulturist Jarrod Fowler has shown that 15% to 60% of North American native bee species are pollen specialists who only eat pollen from 40% of native plants.

This data has been summarized by Level I Ecoregions along with top plants used by pollen specialist bees <u>Click here for the Eastern Temperate Forest—Ecoregion 8</u>. In addition, approximately 4,000 genera of native plants that support over 11,000 lepidoptera can be sorted by zip code in National Wildlife Federation's Native Plant Finder: https://nativeplantfinder.nwf.org/Plants

For purposes of these lists, we have included critical plant genera and local species that host significant numbers of butterflies, moths, and pollen specialist bees. Without these "key" plants, the ecosystem and the wildlife would suffer.

Nature Notes - Take two aspirin?

Looking out my kitchen window this morning I noticed a large hole in the side of the old weeping willow tree. Yep, a red bellied woodpecker nest.

The male was pecking, actually hammering away and making quite a racket. I wondered, do woodpeckers get headaches? Hmmm. According to scientists at ASU, woodpeckers' skulls are more flexible. They have a special bone that acts like a seat-belt for its skull. Even the structure of its beak helps to absorb impact while pecking.

A woodpecker's skull is like an internal bike helmet to keep its brain from getting hurt. Scientists think some of the things they learned about woodpeckers can be used to make better helmets for humans.

What we learn from nature is pretty cool.
