Tree Pests and Diseases of the Urban Forest

Our speaker this month is David Kusnierz, an arborist from 'SavATree'.

David will give a comprehensive presentation of the insects and diseases that are currently impacting trees and shrubs throughout the Chicago Metropolitan area, especially the far western suburbs. He'll detail each pest and its impact on trees and shrubs found in all our gardens and landscapes. Attendees will learn what constitutes an invasive pest as opposed to a native pest, why the right tree in the right place is so important, and how to maintain healthy trees and shrubs so they can withstand the onslaught of pests and diseases as well as climate change.

It is time for our Spring Adopt A Highway roadside pickup. We will be meeting on Saturday, April 15th at 8:45am in the parking lot of the Park District garage at 830 W Hawthorne Lane (Click here for Google Map). We will start our cleanup at 9:00am Expect to spend about 2 hours walking on relatively flat sidewalk & grass.

Once a year, all volunteers will need to sign a liability waiver stating that you won't blame the city if you get hurt during the roadside pickup. Copies of the waiver will be available at Saturday's event. On Saturday, April 29th, the volunteer groups associated with the Great Western Trail and the Illinois Prairie Path are hosting a Path Cleanup Event. Members of the club are invited to join members of the West Chicago Environmental Commission to pick up trash on the Illinois Prairie Path between Route 59 on north and the Great Western Trail on the south.



We will be meeting at 8:45am near the Easternmost entrance on Route 64 to the shopping mall on the corner of Route 59 and Route 64. Look for people wearing orange safety vests. We will start our cleanup at 9:00am. Expect to spend about 2 hours walking on relatively flat gravel pathway & grass.

Plant Sale Volunteer Opportunities

I'm starting to see some old friends poking up through the ground and that means its time to start signing up for potting parties and making plans for our sale on May 20, 2023.

We are using Sign Up Genius again to make it easy to organize the many volunteers it will take to get and acquire our plants, grow them on, get them to the sale and get them sold. Sign up genius can be accessed from a smartphone or computer. Its easy to use but be



mindful to avoid clicking any ads. You do not have to create an account to sign up. If you are on the member roster with an email address available, when you choose a time slot to sign up, you will enter your email and it will prompt you for your name if its not already in the system. Once you sign up, you will get reminders about what you signed up for with further instructions. If there is a last minute change to the plan, I can message everyone signed up with the update. That was helpful last year during the sale when we had to wait out a passing thunderstorm which started just before next shift was due.

We need your plants. If you have plants to offer, use this sign up link to let us know when you expect to be bringing them and what you think you may have. 
After potting, we need a garden club member to **check on the plants** every day to make sure they have enough water, but not too much, haven't been knocked over by high winds or curious animals, have the right amount of light to thrive, and so on. You can sign up for as many days as you like. The more people who sign up the fewer days any of us have to cover. Kokedama

If you have visited any of our local garden centers lately, you might have seen one of these interesting moss balls hanging or lying around.

Kokedama is a centuriesold Japanese form of garden art that is closely

tied to the practice of bonsai. It was inspired by an old tradition that involved the exhibition of the exposed root ball of the bonsai specimen on a plate to highlight the complexity and beauty of its root system. Over time, moss would accumulate on the roots which further enhanced the display.

In Japanese, "Koke" means moss and "dama" means ball. In English, Kokedamas are also called string gardens or the Poor Man's Bonsai.







Kokedama involves using a moss ball as the

supporting and focal point for a plant, succulent, orchid, etc. It consists of wrapping the plant's roots in a ball of soil which you then cover with moss. The moss ball is either fixed to a dish/bowl or suspended in the air with a string. The ball can survive up to 2-3 years, however, the period can be shorter or longer depending on the plant.

News from Kruse

Went to the Kruse Garden to take a short walk, to see what was happening. I was greeted by a small patch of beautiful, vibrant, sunshine yellow flowers of the winter aconite (Eranthus hyemalis). I was surprised to learn that aconite is actually a tuber and not a bulb. These tubers should be planted in the fall the same time you plant your other spring bulbs. Aconite for me, is the harbinger of Spring. It has such a pop of color and it is so cheerful. I hope the Kruse patch of aconite spreads or we add another clump or two.

Then there were the Hellebores that were starting to bloom. One of the earliest flowers to bloom. It's always fun to see this early bloomer. Tried to take a picture but the downward facing flowers were not cooperating. The new varieties are showing more outward facing blooms, it may be worth a try for this old favorite.



There were many bulbs pushing their way up; tulips, daffodils, hyacinth, and alliums to name a few. But there was a clump of beautiful orange/gold crocus that grabbed my attention, so nice with the sun spotlighting their presence. It sure is a cute little clump, love the color.

Hope you enjoyed the short visit to Kruse and I encourage you to stop by and see what else is ready to bloom.
