We will gather in front of the visitor center at 1S151 Winfield Rd, Wheaton, starting at 6:30 p.m.. If you need a ride be at the church at 6:15 p.m. and cars will leave there no later than 6:30 p.m..

There will be a **\$5 per car entry fee** so you are encouraged to carpool. We will have 3 tour guides so our groups can be small. Please respect everyone in your group by keeping chatter to a minimum and addressing questions so the entire group can be included. There will be an announcement of our Plant Sale outcome and distribution of a small treat bag prior to tour. The tours will begin at 7 p.m. and last about an hour. The Park closes at Sunset which is at 8:17 p.m. on May 26, so we cannot tarry in the garden too long after our tours.

Adding Edibles to Your Garden

The Growing Place

You don't need a designated space to grow edibles in your garden. Intermix them in your garden beds for new and beautiful combinations.

Perennial Edibles

Chives are a great low maintenance kitchen garden herb that loves the sun. Grow them near your kitchen door in a garden bed or container so they are easy to reach from early spring all the way through the growing season. They have a mild onion or garlic flavor and their edible lavender flowers are considered a delicacy. Perennial chives can be used as an edging plant in the flower bed where they grow in clustered clumps. They combine well with other early blooming flowers such as iris and columbine.

French Sorrel is the first green to perk up in spring and the last to lose its usefulness in winter. Its bright green leaves are high in Vitamin C and the slightly sour taste of the leaves combine well with chicken, fish, and eggs. Cut its distinctive sword-shaped leaves as you need them and allow the plant to regrow after each harvest. If not allowed to bloom, French Sorrel adds a soft graceful shape and texture to the flower border. It likes full sun and moist soil but is very adaptable to other conditions. Simply cut its distinctive sword-shaped leaves as you need them and allow the plant to regrow after each harvest.

Asparagus can be planted in rows in the vegetable garden or decoratively in the garden. Its foliage is soft and fernlike and provides a beautiful background for other perennial plants. Asparagus plants need full sun, and because they remain in place for many years, the soil should be prepared very well.

Strawberries are a favorite of just about everyone! Easy to grow in any sunny location, and even in a container. Combine a spring-bearing variety with an ever-bearing type to have some to harvest all season long. If you are limited in space, try growing the alpine strawberries. They form neat clumps and can be used as an edible edging in the flower garden.

Vegetables

Do you have a particularly sunny spot in the garden where a tomato will flourish? Go ahead plant your favorite tomato variety there! Instead of using just a plain tomato cage for support, use a decorative rose topiary. You'll have delicious tomatoes and a beautiful garden accent piece.

Of course, you can't forget to mix in leafy crops like lettuce, spinach, swiss chard, and kale. They add texture and color to any garden. Let some Bright Lights Swiss Chard mature they will have vividly colored stalks in red, orange and yellow. Cabbage and kale can also add interesting texture and color element to your garden.

Herbs

Herbs make some of the best additions to your garden with their varied leaf textures and flowers. And best of all, many of them are rabbit resistant because those pesky rabbits do not like to get the scent on their fur. Plant herbs around a particularly tasty favorite to help deter them.
