News from Kruse by Angie & Billie, Kruse House Garden Coordinators

Gardening is not some sort of game by which one proves his superiority over others, nor is it a marketplace for the display of elegant things that others cannot afford. It is, on the contrary, a growing work of creation, endless in its changing elements. It is not a monument or an achievement, but a sort of traveling, a kind of pilgrimage you might say, often a bit grubby and sweaty though true pilgrims do not mind that. A garden is not a picture, but a language, which is of course the major art of life.

This thought brings to mind the Kruse Museum garden, a sort of **'growing work of creation,'** endless in its evolvment and tweaked by garden pilgrims over the years. Started in 1917 and maintained into the 1960's by Celia Kruse and her family, the garden thrived. Then for almost thirty years it was grassed over and forgotten. In 1999 **Chris and Dennis Baxter and Nancy Assian**, docents at the Museum decided to excavate it and see if structures and remnants of the old garden remained. Ms. Assian realized the extent of the project and had a thought—resurrect the West Chicago Garden Club, dormant since the 1970's, with the idea that the garden would be a club project. **Carole Bates was elected the first president** and the club and garden took off.

From the early plantings to the most recent additions, caretakers of the garden groomed and passed on their work to others. Members and nurseries added their donations. Over the years not all plants grew well, and some possible mistakes were made—why did Celia plant those lady bells? The garden is a kind of time travel.

When we work in the garden **we remember fellow gardeners** when we see their plants, even those gardeners almost lost in memory. The pilgrim today can look at the garden and possibly say, "Celia planted the hyacinths and her pear tree has great pears—too bad they're so high. See Carole's Miss Kim? It didn't want to grow for her, but it's doing well here. Pauline's Iris rebloomed in September. That Summer Lilac is three years old. We got it from Lou. Barbara and Dick planted the lilacs when they were only a foot high. It's variegated? It must be Billie's. And where, oh, where is Marion's Lespedeza? And so we garden and remember...



Dan Beebe, the garden pilgrim before us, and the members who gardened with him, can see the large white trellis to the east that was put in during their tenure and see plants nestled in at that time now much larger. And the Baxters and Ms. Assian can see the result of their excavation, a garden.

We are now the pilgrims. Here for a while, leaving some imprint and then we, as others before us, will pass the garden on to the next pilgrim. And the garden will continue to be a growing **"work of creation, endless in its changing elements..."**

Worth the Trip - Brussels' Flower Carpet (thanks to Jon Passini for this great news tip!)

You may have heard of or even visited the Quilt Gardens in Elkhart County, Indiana. These gardens are laid out as quilt patterns across the county providing a beautiful display. (see more at <http://www.amishcountry.org/things-to-do/quilt-gardens>).



But if you're interested in more than a daytrip, maybe you want to consider visiting Brussels, Belgium, the weekend of 15 August 2012, for the biannual Flower Carpet extravaganza. This event is a year in the planning, assembled in just 4 hours, and is on display for only 3 days. The Flower Carpet is constructed using ~ 800,000 begonias packed so tightly no soil is required and is located at the Grand-Place in Brussels.

The first Floral Carpet as its present-day form was created in 1971 on the Grand-Place by the landscape architect E. Stautemans. Today when planning the carpets, considerations are given to special events, including ideas from local horticultural societies. In 2010, the carpet honored the Belgian presidency of the European Union, which rotates among the member countries. Other cultural events such as music performances and fireworks are also part of the fun during the weekend.

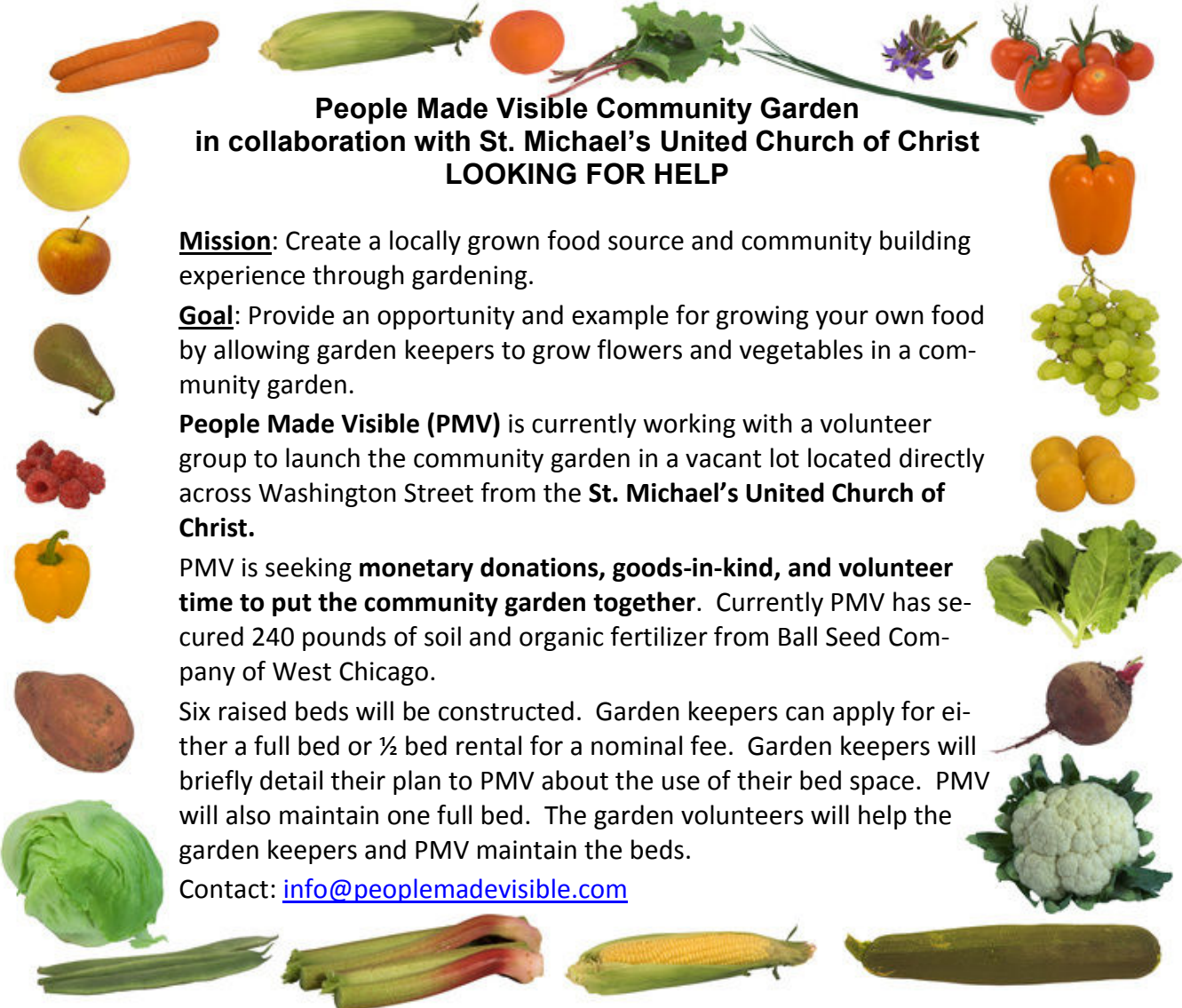

People Made Visible Community Garden
 in collaboration with St. Michael's United Church of Christ
LOOKING FOR HELP

Mission: Create a locally grown food source and community building experience through gardening.

Goal: Provide an opportunity and example for growing your own food by allowing garden keepers to grow flowers and vegetables in a community garden.

People Made Visible (PMV) is currently working with a volunteer group to launch the community garden in a vacant lot located directly across Washington Street from the **St. Michael's United Church of Christ**.

PMV is seeking **monetary donations, goods-in-kind, and volunteer time to put the community garden together**. Currently PMV has secured 240 pounds of soil and organic fertilizer from Ball Seed Company of West Chicago.

Six raised beds will be constructed. Garden keepers can apply for either a full bed or ½ bed rental for a nominal fee. Garden keepers will briefly detail their plan to PMV about the use of their bed space. PMV will also maintain one full bed. The garden volunteers will help the garden keepers and PMV maintain the beds.

Ageless Beauties: Plants that Stand the Test of Time by *The Growing Place*



Peonies are some of the biggest, boldest and most beautifully fragrant of the herbaceous flowering plants for sun. They become grander each season and are extraordinarily long-lived. Tree peonies are showstoppers in sun to light shade with enormous crepe-paper flowers and woody stems. Somewhat new on the market are the Itoh hybrids, a cross of tree peonies and herbaceous peonies developed for large tissue-like flowers in unusual colors such as yellow. Of course, there are many types of old-fashioned herbaceous peonies in whites, pinks, corals, reds, and bi-colors with early, mid and late bloom times. The Coral Charm peony in the gardens at the Aurora location has been untouched for

about 20 years. There are even fernleaf varieties that offer delicate texture and early blossoms. One example, Laddie, has been growing at the Naperville location for nearly 50 years and we have propagated the ones for sale from the original plant.

Another large perennial for longevity is baptisia or false indigo. From our native *Baptisia australis* to the hot new cultivars, you can find one that suits your full sun site. In general, baptisia is a large, loosely vase shaped plant with blue green foliage and tall spikes of pea-like flowers followed by dark seedpods. The Chicago Botanic Garden has introduced many new varieties including ones that are a bit smaller in size. This prairie plant resents being moved and doesn't require division. At The Growing Place in Naperville, some of the baptisia in the Annuals Department is nearly 60 years old and still lovely.

Hosta is our classic perennial for shade. From large varieties such as Sum and Substance and Sagae to diminutive Blue Mouse Ears, there is a hosta for every shady site. These long-lived beauties thrive with division or left alone and offer big bold texture year after year. There are hundreds if not thousands of varieties of hosta to choose from in blues, greens, chartreuses, and many variegated types. You can easily add a splash of color with these hardy plants and some are fragrant in bloom. We enjoy including their lily-like flowers in late summer bouquets.

Some long-lived perennial varieties will be on sale at The Growing Place from June 3 to June 9. We hope you will join us on June 11 in Naperville for the daylong celebration 75th Anniversary Party: Diamonds and Delphiniums. Make a stepping-stone, enjoy sales, a celebration picnic bbq, a talk on old favorites, giveaways and more. Check www.thegrowingplace.com for details.
