I am also planning another walkway to a patio for the ideal view of the pond and surrounding trees.

What is your favorite houseplant: We are lucky to have a large sunroom with a southern exposure—home to 23 houseplants, large and small. My favorite would be an impressive philodendron that has quadrupled in size.

Favorite garden tool: Hand clippers

Favorite flower & love to grow: I love peonies, roses, and have recently discovered the Maximillien Sunflower which grew into a giant this year. But my special favorites are the Mexican Sunflowers that I grow from seed every year (I have never seen them in nurseries. I fell in love with their vibrant orange (favorite color) flowers on a visit to Cantigny when I first moved nearby. I also love hardy hibiscus and have been adding them to the yard over the years. The size of the blooms and the vibrant colors are spectacular.

New Year's Resolution: To plant more trees for fall color, to prune the peach tree for less fruit and to plant fewer tomato plants—we were overwhelmed this season. Also to spray the roses for bugs in the spring because they seem to get really ravaged in the early months. If I have the time and energy, fertilize the flowers/plants once in a while.

Growing Native—Covering up & staying safe in the native garden! Ruth Gauss

Hi, gardening friends! Continuing in the tradition of gifts for gardeners as my last newsletter topic for the year, this year I thought I would address how to dress comfortably for the work that we do outdoors. Let's dive in, head first (pun intended)! (Look for sales on these items at this time of year.)

Head Covering—a garden hat protects you from the sun, and especially with its wide brim it makes my dermatologist happy, but I find it helps to keep branches off of my face as well. This one is lightweight so I don't feel like my head gets super hot even on those mid-summer days and the chin strap keeps it in place no matter what the wind or my head is doing (think leaning over for digging or weeding)

I'll include a women's style here that is newer than mine. There are lots of different choices out there and I encourage you to find what works best for you.

Women's Global Adventure™ Packable Hat III (from Columbia)

Arm and Hand Covering—I don't know about you, but sometimes I just need to head out for a quick watering or weeding session and I don't want to have to take the time to put on sunscreen but also don't want to chance getting too much sun if/when I accidentally stay out longer than expected. One solution is the Farmer's Defense Protection Sleeves. I have a previous style that is just a fun print, but now they have lots of additional options like solids, pro-mesh (for extra cooling on the upper arm), and insect repellant. I find that even my old-style sleeves keep me cooler than I expected as well as keeping my arms clean and irritation free. They also have hats, gloves (including nitrile, which is my favorite since I have a rubber sensitivity), and neck gaiters, most of which come in fun patterns or more sedate colors if that's what you like.

Shirts and Pants—If you've seen me in the outdoors you know that I love to wear clothes that keep me comfortable in many ways. My skin is very sensitive, the sun, protection products (DEET), plants, and bugs, can all cause problems and I am happiest all covered up. I may look uncomfortable to you, but the clothing I wear is usually as cool and comfortable as short sleeved shirts and shorts would be for someone else. The key is construction. The fabrics I wear are meant to breathe and move and that works very well for me. I love Eddie Bauer products because they are very durable and last for years! Some other products I've seen recently have insect repellant incorporated into the clothing. Some recent finds are: Craghoppers (which is where I found the hat pictured—going on my Christmas wishlist this year!), LLBean, REI, and the obvious Insect Shield, which also will treat clothing that you send to them and would be a great option for something that has lost its effectiveness.

Ginkgos are large trees (65-115 feet) that are long-lived, disease-resistant with unique fanshaped leaves. They have brilliant yellow autumn foliage. Ginkgos are native to East Asia and first appeared over 290 million years ago. A beautiful specimen is in the Kruse House Garden.
