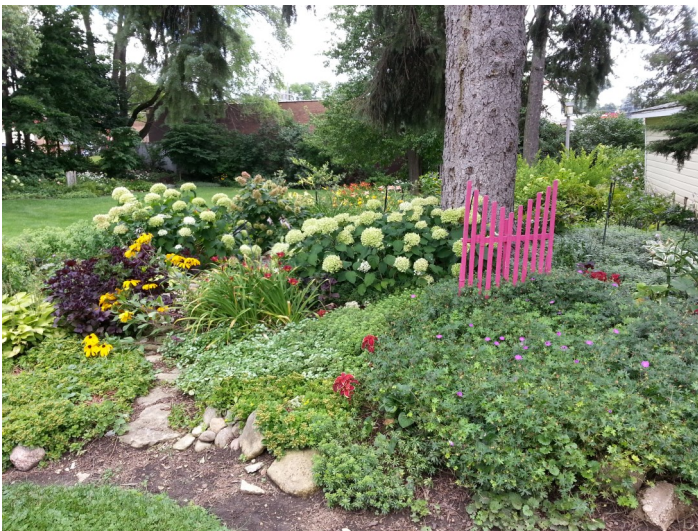

Add a Little Something to Your Gardens This Fall by Heather Prince of The Growing Place

Leaves are falling, perennials are fading and trees are turning. October is the perfect opportunity to add, amend and plant for a great start in spring. Take advantage of the cool days that make working in the yard a pleasure.

Plant a Tree

Fall is a wonderful time to plant trees. The soil is still warm and increased rains make it the perfect situation for root growth. Many of us have lost trees this year to storms or emerald ash borer. Planting a tree this fall means you can enjoy the architecture this winter and start the spring with fresh new leaves or flowers. The Growing Place still has a good selection of trees in all types and sizes.

Amend Beds for Spring Planting

Adding organic materials such as compost, leaf mulch, or untreated lawn clippings now allows them to slowly break down and enrich the soil over the winter. Chopped leaves work best as the smaller the pieces, the faster it breaks down. The natural freeze/thaw cycle, microorganisms and beneficial mycorrhizae all help to work important micronutrients into your beds and open up more spaces for air and water to move through. Add about three inches of amendments and dig them in a little. Then top it off with a layer of mulch and let nature take its course.

Start a Compost Pile

Fallen leaves can become a wonderful garden amendment by spring simply by allowing them to decompose. Check with your homeowners association before starting a compost pile to make sure it is allowed. You can add any type of vegetable matter including grass clippings, leaves, flowers, twigs and more. Add kitchen vegetable scraps as long as there is no meat, bones or fatty foods present. It's best to use a ratio of one third leaves and small twigs (dried materials) to two thirds fresh materials. This allows the pile to have good air spaces for microorganisms to thrive. In general, start with a six to 12 inch layer of chopped up, moist organic matter, then an inch of soil to introduce microorganisms. Continue layering until you reach the desired size. The best size for a hot compost pile above ground is one cubic yard or three feet high, wide, and deep. You can build one from wood planks, cinder blocks, wire or plastic fencing or purchase a pre-made bin. To ensure the best air and water movement, make sure there are ventilation spaces along the sides.
