Biomimicry: Looking to Nature to Solve Today's Problems

What does a Bur have in common with NASA? A Kingfisher with a high-speed train? In this fascinating talk, Kim will show you many examples of when science and technology looked to nature to solve complex problems. Notes from the President

It has been a busy month for members of the Allocations Committee, the Bylaws Committee and the club's board. At this month's board meeting, we discussed results of the Member Survey conducted by the Allocations Committee and their recommendations on how the club should spend money throughout the year. We also discussed changes to the club's bylaws, last updated in 2015, proposed by the Bylaws Committee.

In summary, based on your survey feedback, the Allocations Committee recommended: Increasing the annual budget for speakers, workshops, Bulb Bingo; Investing in improved video and audio equipment for speakers at our meetings; Recruiting members to assist in planning bus field trip(s) to Botanic Gardens; Maintaining and/or increase budget as needed for Plant Sale; Maintaining budget for West Chicago Park District; Maintaining or increasing, as needed, the budget for Kruse House Garden; and that the Board consider a \$1,000 donation to the College of DuPage Horticulture Department to be awarded to a deserving student.

The Allocations Committee recommended that the club "maintain a minimum of \$20,000 or the balance of the last two years expenses, whichever is greater, in reserve. The WCGC should keep sufficient funds to be able to maintain club activities as much as possible for a two year period without substantial income. This is important in order to improve the likelihood that the WCGC can and will survive possible disruptions due to outside forces" (e.g., global pandemic, plant sale cancellation due to bad weather).

The Bylaws Committee's recommended changes and feedback from the board were also discussed at length. The board is hopeful that we will be able to approve the Bylaws changes at our meeting next month and that the proposed changes will be available to the membership by next month's general meeting. Our goal is to have a membership vote on the revised Bylaws at our annual club meeting in November.


Survey Results (Page 1 of 3)

The Survey conducted by our Allocations Committee was a success—We received a total of 57 surveys from our members. The pie chart below shows the responses to how may years each person has been a member of the club.

To make the data a little easier to read, we calculated a weighted average for each question that was rated on a scale from 1 to 5.

An example of this is shown here using the data from the first major section of the survey that asked your level of interest in various broad categories. This is the data for "Learning—Become a better gardener" which you could rate from "Very important" to "Not interested". There were 5 levels, so we assigned points to each




answer with 5 for "Very important" to 1 for "Not interested". The raw results look like this:

	Very Important (5)	Important (4)	Not a priority (3)	Indifferent (2)	Not interested (1)
Learning—Become a Better Gardener	26	23	7	1	0

The weighted average is calculated by adding up all the points and dividing by the number of people who responded to that question. These points add up as 26x5 + 23x4 + 7x3 + 1x2 + 0x1 = 245. All 57 responses answered this question, so we divide 245 by 57 which gives us an average response of 4.3 for this question.


The first chart below, shows the weighted average for all 6 categories, sorted from lowest interest to highest interest. The categories shown on the survey were "Learning– Becoming a better gardening", "Social Interaction-Feel a sense of community", "Community-giving back to our town/community", Adventure-Field trips to see beautiful places", Enrichment-sharing and collecting plants"



Survey Results (Page 2 of 3)



The descriptions for each was a little long to include in a chart, so they are somewhat abbreviated. 


The full raw data for this category is included on the next page for those who are interested in seeing the breakdown for each.

News from Kruse

Summer is waning and fall flowers are making their spectacular debut in the Kruse House Garden. Several new perennials, including Chelone and Lobelia, were planted in the front bed.

Turtlehead (Chelone obliqua) is a clumpforming perennial wildflower native to eastern North America. Its hooded flowers look similar to snapdragon blooms. The flower gets its common name from its resemblance to a turtle's head, but the genus name Chelone dates back to ancient Greece mythology.





Blue lobelia, purple cone flowers and black eyed susans

Turtlehead is best planted in the spring or summer to give the plant time to establish itself. The plant can remain in bloom for three to six weeks, making it well worth the wait for late-season color.

Great Blue Lobelia forms a flower spike covered in deep blue flowers from late summer to early fall. It can form colonies when happily sited in medium to wet soils in light shade, but is not overly aggressive. Combine Blue Lobelia with Red

Cardinal Flower for a stunning color combo that will bring in the hummingbirds. Excellent for damp clay soil. (Lobelia siphilitica)

Blooming behind the shed is Lespedeza, also called bush clover. It has delicate foliage and is laden with thousands of rosypurple pea like flowers. Across the path are bright yellow False Sunflowers that were planted last fall.

The Kruse Crew meets Wednesday mornings from about 8:30 until 11:30 to weed, plant and discuss gardening ideas. Break time is always educational and fun. Hope you will join us.

If You Build It, They Will Come

Working together, we have planted several Monarch pollinator gardens. One of these is at St. Andrew Lutheran Church in West Chicago. Cristobal Cavazos, of Immigrant Solidarity, talked to Pastor Josh Ebener about doing a Monarch garden on a grass area south of the church. We developed a landscaping plan and presented it to the church. With their approval, we started. The area was roughly 40 feet by 120 feet. We needed to get rid of the sod. We tried covering the grass with tarps over the winter, but that didn't kill the grass as hoped. We really didn't want to herbicide. After a long time looking for someone who could remove the top 2 inches of sod so we could plant, we found a local landscaper, Daniel Fuentes, who volunteered to remove the sod and help us with the stonework for the pathway.

This was early 2021. After removing the sod, we had 40,000 lbs. of crushed stone ordered for the path foundation. Unfortunately, we couldn't dump it where we were working, so we had to dump it on the parking lot and use a small trailer to spread it by hand.

Once we had the path outlined, we hand sowed a native seed mix. It was a combination of many different native flowering plants to provide nectar, several types of milkweed, and a variety of tall grasses. All the plants are native to our area. They will provide nectar and a place for butterflies to lay eggs. A large portion of the seeds were collected and

donated by members of Wild Ones-Dupage. We put in over 1,200 plants by hand. This was fall 2021.



We have the best volunteers to help us! Many people helped plant, work on the pathway, and weed. Our thanks to Miguel Romero, Mateo Suarez, Robert Cook, Andrew Van Gorp, Gabriela Hernandez Chico, Rafael Vieyra, Cristobal Cavazos, Rocio Hernadez, Patricia and Marti Landry, and Bob Sherman. Without their support and hard work, we couldn't have accomplished this. The brick pathway is an amazing design and is yet to be finished. The center will have a butterfly done in tile, by a local artist.

We couldn't wait for spring 2022 to come! At first, a few plants were coming up, but they were very sparse. It looked promising, but not as many as we hoped for. During the spring and summer of 2022, we worked on

the pathway, pulled weeds, and added more native plants. Slowly, the plants took root and flourished. It was amazing how the area filled in.



It will take several years for some of the plants to flower. We need to find volunteers who can help us maintain this beautiful native Pollinator Garden. If you would like to be part of bringing nature back to us, you can reach me at Rllnstns1@aol.com to help.



Month-By-Month Gardening Tips: August

"Month-By-Month Gardening Illinois, Indiana, Ohio: What To Do Each Month To Have A Beautiful Garden All Year" by Beth Botts

"The early days of September can be among the sweetest of the year...Sweet corn, tomatoes, and blueberries are still plentiful. But fall is here."

PLAN:

- Take stock of what worked and what didn't
- Best solution for garden problems is to be ruthless; if the plant/shrub doesn't work start over with something new
- Still time to order bulbs; refer to your spring notes and pictures for ideas
- Stock up on floating row covers or old sheets to protect plants from early frost



- Fall-blooming mums, asters and pansies
- Early fall flowers (PS): Japanese anemone, turtlehead, gentian
- Fall flowers (Sun): asters, sedum, purple coneflower, Russian sage, black-eyed Susan
- Excellent time to plant trees
- Plant bulblets of garlic and shallots for next year's harvest
- Plant or divide perennials and groundcovers

CARE:

- Keep weeding to prevent sprouting next spring
- Pull up dead annuals and compost
- Mulch areas to prevent weed seeds to sprout
- Tender plants like coleus, begonias, Persian shield, & asparagus fern can be potted in potting mix and grown as houseplants during the winter
- Bring houseplants back in doors when temps begin being below 50 degrees
