Bring some leaves, with the stems still attached, in a vase of water to keep them fresh until we mold them.

Bring some large and small ones and some extras. These leaves should have prominent ribs on the underside of the leaf.

Bring something flat, like a cookie sheet or a board. Cover it in aluminum foil or plastic to protect it. This will be the surface to make you concrete leaf. Bring more than one, if you want to make more than a one project.

Bring along some terry cloth rags. We'll need them to clean out the plastic dishpan that will be provided for you in which to mix the concrete.

### CONCRETE CAST LEAVES

Caution: Follow precaution on concrete bag. We recommend you wear a breathing mask if you have respiratory problems. Wear rubber gloves when working with concrete.

Mix 1 part Portland concrete and 2 ½ parts play sand until blended. Add a small amount of water and mix after each addition. Continue to add water until mixture is the consistency of a thick brownie mix. Place your leaf down flat or on a mound of sand. Pat concrete mixture onto leaf until leaf is covered to within 1 inch of edge. The concrete should be approximately 3/4 inch thick over the center vein of the leaf and tapered to 1/4 inch on outside edge. If the leaf you want to use has a hole in it, just patch the hole with another leaf or clear wrap.

Let the concrete leaf cure for 2 days. Mist with water the 1st day. This will help concrete to cure evenly.

If desired you can paint the leaf with exterior latex paint, thinned with water if necessary.

For a faux verdigris finish, brush, on a base coat of blue-black paint. After the first coat

dries, use a wet sponge to apply a coat of turquoise. Wipe away excess paint with a cotton cloth. Finish with exterior sealant.

If you intend to hang the leaf, imbed a loop of 16-gauge wire in the wet concrete.

If you intend to use the leaf as a hose guide or a platform for birdseed, embed the pipe or stake. You will have to stabilize the pipe with a foam cup etc. for 48 hours.

Bring leaf inside when temperature reaches freezing or turn on side so water does not freeze in leaf. Not to be used as a steppingstone.


