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June Program – Japanese Gardens

The June meeting featured a talk on Japanese gardens by Diane Hunter. To help create the tranquil feel of a Japanese garden, music of a shakuhachi flute was played during the presentation.

Japanese gardens are eastern and old (as much as 2500 years old). Garden design is not left to amateurs and is considered an art. Every garden has Buddhism at its base. The goal is to provide a space for meditation and spiritual growth.

Japanese gardens are designed to be visited in all four seasons. Because of space constraints miniaturization is a staple of these gardens, as are designs that provide the illusion of distant and spaciousness—often in a very small space. One way to view a Japanese garden to make a circle of your

fore-finger and thumb and look at various features of the garden through that small “glass”. To achieve spiritual oneness with the world, the Japanese may sit for hours slowly shifting their focus from one element of the garden to another.

Ms. Hunter’s used slides to illustrate Japanese garden design features: how large rocks in the foreground in a pond give the illusion of a much larger space and how aspects of the landscape (distant mountains, for example) are incorporated into the garden design so they seem to be part of the garden. Rocks, water features, and raked gravel, offer elements that provide interest in any season.

The talk gave those who went on a the field trip to the Andersen Japanese Garden some ideas about how to appreciate those gardens.

Members at the June Meeting asked for Sandy Saad's Rhubarb cake recipe.

Outrageous Rhubarb Coffee Cake

- 1 Cup buttermilk
- 1/4-1/2 cup melted butter or margarine
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 cups chopped rhubarb
- 2 3/4 cups flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Topping

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup light cream, half-and-half or evaporated milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

1. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9 by 13 inch baking pan.
2. Mix buttermilk, melted butter, egg and vanilla. Stir in rhubarb. In a separate bowl mix flour, white sugar, baking soda and salt. Stir the wet ingredients into the dry until just combined.
3. Spread batter in pan; sprinkle brown sugar and nuts on top. Bake 45-55 minutes, until toothpick inserted in center of cake comes out clean.
4. Meanwhile, stir and heat the topping ingredients in a small saucepan. When coffee cake comes out of the oven, poke deep holes over the entire surface with a meat fork or skewer. Drizzle the warm sauce over the cake. Cool and serve.

Note: Sliced strawberries or pitted tart cherries could be substituted for, or added to, the rhubarb.

If you want to watch the fat content, you could use the smaller amount of butter and half the topping.




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MASTER GARDENING: Expanding, Exploring and Enriching Our Knowledge of Gardening Through Learning and Volunteering

During the past year, I have been participating in the master gardening program offered by the University of Illinois Extension Office/DuPage County in Wheaton Illinois. The Master Gardening Program trains adult volunteers to help disseminate up-to-date, research-based horticulture information to home gardeners. The program is sanctioned by Land Grant universities in all 50 states. The DuPage Master Gardening Program has approximately 120 Master Gardeners from all parts of the County.

I had to take a series of classes in all the key areas of gardening. This included 66 hours of basic botany, soils, turf management, insects, integrated pest management, vegetables, trees, bulbs, flowers, roses and landscaping. The courses were taught by University of Illinois Extension educators and other horticultural experts. An online version of this program is now available. An exhaustive list of publications on gardening is made available to students as well as key reference web sites. In addition to formal class room study, I had to complete a minimum of 60 hours of volunteer services. I have volunteered time in the Extension Office in Wheaton manning the Master Gardener Hot Line and helping with the Plant Clinics that are held on certain days of the week. I also volunteer maintaining the gardens at Kline Creek Farm in Winfield and the Butterfly Garden at the Willowbrook Wild Life Center in Glen Ellyn. I also conduct plant therapy at The Terrace Nursing Home in West Chicago.

There are numerous other master gardening projects and programs within the county along with a speakers bureau and an information desk program such as was provided at the West Chicago Blooming Festival this past May. I have found the master gardening experience very enriching by providing expanded knowledge of gardening and many opportunities to explore new avenues of gardening expression.
